

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## EDITORIAL





God has touched their hearts and it is incumbent upon them to give themselves and what resources they have, small or great, to Him. The Malaysian Baptist Convention is hostess for BWA Annual Gathering. More than 300 Baptist leaders and delegates have gathered in Kuala Lumpur from July 4-9 for the BWA Annual Meeting. The BWA involves yearly meetings of a num-

ber of BWA groups, including the General Council and the Executive Committees; executive subcommittees and divisional advisory committees; women's, men's and youth departments; regional groupings; and commissions of the divisions of Freedom & Justice, and Mission, Evangelism & Theological Reflection, plus others. Four organizations in Africa have been accepted into membership of the Baptist World Alliance (BWA) at the meeting of the General Council. The BWA now has 222 member bodies in 120 countries.



A few days before the gathering was the WD (Women's Department) annual meeting. There were together WD officers - President Raquel Contreras, Director Patsy Davies, Secretary-treasurer Donna Groover and 7 continental presidents. It was the first meeting guided by our new president Raquel Contreras. It was a very good meeting, very nice and efficient and at the same time there was a spir-

itually warm atmosphere. Each president shared her report of the past year and then we prayed for each continent's president and of course you all are included in our prayers. All are sending you warm and hearty greetings!

Raquel read from Acts 16:11-19. For women it is natural to be together. Lydia was a busy woman – a business woman and home keeper but she always had time for God.

Report on our Visit to Wales

March 15-20<sup>th</sup> saw the EBWU leaders arrive in Wales for our yearly committee meeting. The invitation had been issued some time previously and what a joy it was to be in Wales! We were warmly met at Cardiff airport by Rosemary and Evan Morgan, who acted as our hosts and drivers for the duration of our stay. As we left Cardiff airport, the sun was

shining brightly in welcome, and as we travelled through the countryside to our destination, the daffodils were out in bloom along the wayside, waving in the breeze to greet us. It was most enjoyable to sit and relax and to admire the views from the car.

We were based in Llandeilo, Carmarthenshire, where the Welsh language is freely spoken. We were very indebted to Rev. Mary Davies, pastor of five churches in the area including Llandeilo for allowing us access to the church where our meetings were held. Members of the church provided us with lunch each day. Two of the other churches pastored by Rev Mary provided our evening meal on Wednesday and

Friday. It was lovely to sit down with the people of the churches and share fellowship and conversation with them over our meals. They were interested in us and of course we were interested in them. The food was wonderful; we were so well fed that our clothes felt tight by the end of our visit! The fellowship also was wonderful and we were so blessed by being with God's people.



Business was conducted Wednes-

day – all day, Thursday – morning, Friday – all day and for an hour on Saturday morning. The business included various reports from each of the committee, from the countries we are in contact with, and from other agencies. Finance always features in our business; a fair amount of time is spent dealing with requests for funding

for a variety of projects within the Union. Prayer and consideration has to be given with regard to what projects to support and to what amount can be allocated to these projects. Planning ahead also takes up our time and on this occasion we were thinking about the autumn conference to be held in Tallin, Estonia, at the request of the Estonian women. Europe is responsible for 2013 Baptist Women's Day of Prayer, and we reminded ourselves so we could each be praying and noting our thoughts.

Across the road from the church where our business was conducted was a beautiful view across the valley which stretched for miles. As the weather was good and the

sun shone, once we had eaten lunch we went outdoors to enjoy the fresh air, the scenery, and to have some gentle exercise by having short walks in the vicinity of the church.

On Thursday afternoon we paid a brief visit to the Welsh Baptist Union Office on the way to Broad



Haven, Pembrokeshire to visit Yona Pusey, a former Secretary and President of EB-WU. She had arranged for us to have afternoon tea with some of the local Baptist ladies in a restaurant owned and run by a Latvian lady which brought much delight to Livija, our present President who is from Riga, Latvia.



Following tea we each shared a little of our roles within EB-WU and then we were taken to Yona's home which is situated on a cliff top with a commanding view of the sea in St Bride's Bay. We had a beautiful view of the setting sun as we watched it sink beneath the horizon, praising God for





It was a wonderful time, a blend together of worship and praise and Welsh culture of music and song brought to us by various bards, singers and musicians who had won prizes at the national Eisteddfod, the annual Welsh festival of poetry and music. Again each of us shared about EBWU between the items of music and song. This was one of the highlights of our visit, and will be long remembered. In the evening Rosemary provided a lovely supper for us in her home, and we enjoyed a time of fellowship together.



# "The Lord has done great things for us and we rejoiced"

This verse from Psalm 126:3 was the motto of the conference organized by Ukrainian Women's Baptist Union. This conference was held 24-25 March 2011 at the Christian University in Kiev. This event had a special, yet solemn nature, since it was the climax of 20 years

long service of Baptist Women Union in Ukraine. In the meeting participated 125 women, who were leaders of women's service in 25 districts of the Baptist Union in Ukraine. Some foreign guests who were invited also took part in the meeting: the president of the European Baptist Women's Union - Livija Lame from Latvia, sisters from Belarus, Moldova, Russia, USA and Ewa Gutkowska, who is making this report.



The setting of this conference was prepared with great care. When the leaders were introduced at the same time the map of Ukraine was put together from pieces of districts which those sisters were representing. The sisters who were conducting the conference were dressed in national clothes and the song chanted at the beginning "Prayer for Ukraine" moved everyone to the depths of their hearts, bringing the joy of freedom and a heightening feeling of gratitude for the great deeds that the Lord performed in this country through women.

The Baptist Union in Ukraine is the biggest in

Europe and it includes about 135000 members with women constituting 75%. The women make a considerable contribution in the mission work of the churches and in winning others for Christ.

The President of the Ukrainian Union, Vyacheslav Nesteruk, participating in the opening of the conference, thanked the sisters for their previous and current eager-

ness in service and devotion in prayer, and at the same time he gave some advice for further years. He encouraged them to continue prayer for pastors, leaders, for new calls and for their own husbands so that they could get more involved in church work. He encouraged them also to engage in mission and evangelization not only in Ukraine but also in other countries in Europe.

Sister Nadia Komendant, the President of the women's service until 2006 and whose participation together with sister Aleksandra Kowalenko in organizing the work in particular districts is unquestionable and immense, shared with us the previous history of women's work for the Lord the memories which go back in the past into the end of the nineteenth century. Many of the women paid a high price for their engagement in Christian work and suffered arrests, tortures, prison and even loss of life during the communist regime. In the end sister Nadia stressed that all those stories about how God used women we not only should remember, but we must remember.

The President of the women's service since 2006 - Svetlana Swischova in her multimedia presentation, highlighted the leaders and their work over the in past 20 year period. In her report she laid out the main directions of women's service: service of prayer, service of learning God's Word, service of carrying help, service of evangelization - the numerous examples of which were presented by sisters engaged in these services.



The President of the European Women's Union – Livija Lame in her presentation emphasized the meaning and value of love in the work for the Lord, which in the multitude of daily duties and work may be lost. She quoted facts and gave examples about this that because of love for Jesus, Christian martyrs died. The message of Livija was additionally developed in the preaching, which was shared on the last day by one of the pastors, on the basis of the text from John's Gospel 13:34-35, indicating love as the recognizable sign of Christians.

I am grateful to God that I could participate in this particular meeting of the Ukrainian sisters and to pass on to them greetings and good wishes from the Polish women. God once again showed me **what great deeds He did** through those sisters from Ukraine who are faithful in prayers and dedicated in service. This report is a short account of this event and there is no place for descriptions of sometimes dramatic stories of women's lives, which teach me, personally, humbleness before God's greatness and faithfulness and in themselves bring a freedom of gratitude. And that atmosphere of gratitude and joy expressed in various ways including poetry and songs sung by the men's choir "Syjon" and the women's choir from Charkov infected everybody and united us causing, through this meeting, glory was given to the Highest God.

# EVANGELISM IN RUSSIA

## **Evangelism is our Main Goal**

One of the core tasks for us as Christians is described in the Gospel of Matthew 28:19-20. Among the various methods of evangelism are private and public evangelism. Both these methods women are using in our ministry. In the city of Volgograd at Christmas time there was the drama "He came as a Stranger".

We prayed for its preparation and implementation for three months. We distributed invitations to families and friends. At the performance, ultimately, were about 300 non-believers. Now for them we have open Bible Courses.

In December 2010, the celebration of the 130<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Church of Evangelical Christian-Baptists in Tsaritsyn took place. (Tsarina used to be the name of our city, which was preceded lately by Stalingrad and Volgograd). To the celebration



we invited our friends and were glad that many of them attended. At this celebration were stands depicting the life of yesterday and today of the Baptist churches in our city. There were shown listening slides about the history of the Christian-Baptists. Finally there was a wonderful concert of Christian songs. Our women were involved in its preparation and performance.

We will never appreciate the love of Christ, if we do not see it on the background of His for-

giveness. "We love Him because He first loved us" - 1 John. 4:19. Of course, our personal testimonies are as a powerful tool in evangelism. The success of evangelism is measured by the number of those we helped, who heard and accepted the Gospel, and who came to God and became a member of the church. We can also add that in our local Training Center we have students who live in the outback. They testify to Christ by the way they live their lives, using the 'evangelism of presence' method. About myself I would like to say that I use my computer to do outreach and carry on correspondence with people whom I meet on the Internet.

I would like to give some personal testimonies of our sisters.

### Irina Ananyeva:

At my work I often have talks with the girls about God, because many of them know that I go to church. But the spiritual questions do not always arise. We talk about problems and our conversation sometimes takes a religious route. My neigh-

bours talk about God. We invite them to concerts, to watch the film "Jesus".

As soon as I came to believe, I started to read, to study and understand the Bible. Most of the girls' parents forbade them to talk with me, but now they can decide with whom to communicate. Recently I met with one of them, and she asked me: "Do you still go to church?" - "Yes" I replied. So we began to talk about Christ again. I invited her to watch "Jesus" film



and join discussions afterwards. Again I met her and asked: "Well, how was the film and how did you like it?" Her answer was positive. She even invited her mother. Her mother enjoyed it too; although before, she did not want even to listen about God. That's how it is now!

From time to time I talk with ladies walking with the children, next to me; I try to have a conversation about God. Sometimes, I do not know where to start, and then it happens that I share my own conversation in testimony. Not immediately a slap in the face, it all depends on the circumstances. Not so often I have the opportunity to testify. My husband bears witness in our courtyard to many people who drink and are drug addicts; he shows Christ and invites them to church. But sin keeps them firmly. And so far none of them have gone to church, although many had promised to come and hear the Word of God.

#### Victoria Dovzhenko:

In Volzhskiy there was a festival of Christian culture following the film "Jesus." It



was organized by the mission New Life and the Church of Evangelical Christian-Baptists. We prepared for this project for more than two years. There were five levels of training for all church members who wanted to participate in the event. On October 15, 2010 we started the showing of the movie in the cinemas in our town, and it finished with a gala concert on 13 and 14 of November.

Our church has donated money for this project and continues to donate to this very day. At the entrance our women handed out questionnaires to the people who came to the movie and got the feedback that they filled in. According to statistics, this film was watched by about six thousand people. Now we have formed a group that engages the brothers and sisters from our church in various programmes. We have organized a

group of teens of 8-10 people, which visit mostly girls. In January 2011, we began to meet with them every Saturday. To our group came a girl, who did not see the "Jesus" film, but wanted to learn about God. We plan to develop this ministry further. We also would like to hold a summer camp, called "Dream" for the unbelieving adolescents in the cities of Volgograd and Volzhskiy.

We practice the personal evangelism. At a meeting with neighbours, colleagues at work start a conversation about God. Personally, at work I have continuously evangelised in connection with the children's classes on spiritual and moral education. Colleagues ask me questions as soon as it comes to God. They know whom to call and ask. Recently, I was sent on a course on spiritual and moral education at the preschool age. Attending these classes was a priest; he said many things right, but with some I could not agree. I know that the entire training process takes place under the guidance of God. How He will continue to lead me I do not know. At my work I will need to give an account of these courses. I have got something that I want to say to my unbelieving colleagues. I thank God that He uses me in this case.

#### Jamila Tarovatov:

I'd participated in the project "Jesus" film and led a group of non-believers who came after the showing. I also am trying to reach with the Gospel my neighbours and relatives, using the Four Spiritual Laws. In the same way Anna Bobrova

preaches, but she is also actively talking about God to her colleagues. Nastya Chernikova's door is open to the women, who come to her home for advice and instruction. Summarizing, we may say that our women are using every opportunity to car-

ry the love of Christ to all their friends and acquaintances. All our sisters, without exception, use the opportunity of evangelism at work, at home and to all whom they meet in different life situations. We include this ministry in our petitions and pray about the hearts of the people to whom we preach the Gospel. With God's help, we are able to do something. If someone has her own special way of evangelism we'll be glad to know about it. Each of us has a gift given by the Lord. Pray for us, that the Gospel will become "our main business" and that we use, for this purpose, every opportunity.

May God bless all of us in this ministry!

# SWEDEN: JOINT CHURCH

## Something Special Stirring in Sweden



At the beginning of June I had the privilege of attending very important and special meetings in Stockholm, Sweden. It was wonderful to be with some of the Swedish sisters at this stage of the new historical development taking place at present. I was also able to meet up with 'old' friends (see photographs) — Aina Rasmussen, Birgit Karlsson and Karin Wiborn. John Upton, BWA President was also attending these meetings.

For more than three years the

Baptists, Evangelical Methodists and the Mission Covenant Churches have been having discussions to determine if it would be possible to come together as one united Church. In many small villages these denominations have already been cooperating with each other; because of financial restraints it has not been possible for each church to employ a pastor and so resources have been shared and the people have worked closely together. Recently there has been dialogue in each denomination with their members discussing some of the difficult theological issues pertinent to each denomination. The people had the freedom to express their opinions and give their reactions to proposals. These discussions culminated on 4<sup>th</sup> June 2011

when voting resulted positively when they made an agreement to be united in one Joint Church. How pleasant when brothers (and sisters) dwell in harmony! At this meeting byelaws were adopted and an executive committee elected but as yet no president or general secretary appointed. The name of this new church has not been decided either but will continue to be called by its unofficial title – Gemensam Framtid (Joint Church) – for an interim period. As of 2012 these three denominations will merge into one. The youth of these denominations united in 2008.

There are still many questions which require

























answers and issues which need ironed out but the people are determined to comply with Jesus' prayer for unity as this was the primary motive for this amalgamation. Each church will continue to work and serve as is acceptable for them, just as they have been doing.



The women's organisa-

tion also desire to come together in unison. In fact last year at our EBWU conference in Budapest we welcomed Methodist pastor Rev. Alice Cooper who came with the Swedish women. She thoroughly enjoyed herself and the fellowship shared together and we benefited from her being amongst us and enjoyed her company. One afternoon was set aside specifically for the women. I was able to bring the greetings of EBWU to the Swedish women. I was also invited to sit in on the Board Meeting where the women's leaders of the three denominations met for discussion. A decision was made for a general meeting to take place on August 27<sup>th</sup> 2011. At this gathering the new women's organisation will come into being and decide on the structure for leadership etc, choosing a specific Leader. It is anticipated that they will desire to apply for membership of EBWU and this would be a new situation for us too.



This is a new beginning for many in Sweden and has not been entered into without much soulsearching, discussion and prayer, but it now appears to be the way forward for the Baptist, Methodists and Mission Covenanters.

Please pray for our Swedish brothers and sisters that God will give wisdom and clearly lead them; that He will use them to build up the believers and to bring others into the Kingdom. Pray also for the meeting on 27<sup>th</sup> August that again God will give clear guidance in all their deliberations and in the choice of leaders.

## LITHUANIA

#### President's Visit to Lithuania



At the invitation of the Lithuanian women, I was able to go to Vilnius, the capital city, to participate in the Lithuanian Women's Day Conference on May 13<sup>th</sup> 2011.

This event was well organized by the women with help from Brother Vasil from Moldova, and was attended by just under 200 women from different denominations.

This year on 29 &30<sup>th</sup>

October, in Lithuania, the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association is planning to host an initiative called Hope Festival. The Women's Conference was held to encourage, prepare and motivate the women for this up-coming event; to be active, to pray and to strive to have good relationships with their neighbours, colleagues and relatives so that they will attend Hope Festival and find the Truth as they come to know Jesus Christ. Many people are unresponsive to the good news of the Gospel; there are many religious people in Lithuania, maybe attending church twice yearly, but most are nominal believers only and do not have a personal relationship with the Lord Jesus. It is important to give them the opportunity to get to know Him.







Leading the conference was Sandra, the women's committee Leader. The speaker was Nijole Latuziene from Klaipeda. Her husband is a former President of the Lithuanian Baptist Union. Her daughter, Lina Androviene is well known to the EBWU as we supported her for one year during her studies at the International Baptist Theological Seminary in Pra-

gue. Lina is continuing her studies working on her doctorate.

There was a warm atmosphere at the conference and God opened the windows of heaven and poured out His blessing. I felt honoured to be there.

I would ask you to pray for Lithuania; for the Hope Festival in October; for the festival organizers and all those involved in running it; above all pray that salvation comes to many people as a result.

Dear Sisters,

Greetings from Ireland.... and Malaysia.... and the USA.... and The Netherlands! These are countries where I've traveled to in the last few months - and where this message has been formed. As you know, much of my ministry is about helping people to understand the dark world of human trafficking and prostitution - and then helping those who God Calls, to shine God's Light of Unconditional Love into the darkness of that world. What is exciting to me is that this IS God's moment and

many people ARE hearing God's Call to do just that!

Understanding a situation that seems un-understandable sometimes leads us to action: and so please continue reading and I challenge you to pray into this article that you, too, will have a greater understanding and heart and compassion for those who so desperately need to know God's Love through you.

My definition of human trafficking is "the exploitation of vulnerability". Human trafficking equals the exploitation of vulnerability. So why are people vulnerable to the victimization of human trafficking? My own experience and research points to 3 major broad categories. They all overlap in some ways, but I believe that these 3 categories illustrate the majority of reasons for vulnerability and victimization.

- 1) The first is the most obvious: economic hard-ship. Poverty. But not all impoverished women and girls work in prostitution. Twenty-five years ago, when I was first meeting Thai women and girls in prostitution in Bangkok, they told me that they were working in prostitution in order to send money home to their mothers and fathers and to support their brothers and sisters. They were providing food and new houses and vehicles and school fees for their families. They would tell me that they were "sacrificing" themselves for their families. They were raised from birth to believe that the value of their life was dependent on how much money they could make for their families. Their families' economic difficulty combined with the cultural value of obligation to the family creates vulnerability that is exploited. In many community-based cultures around the world, including some cultures in Europe, the girl child is raised with this value that she is economically responsible for her family. And if she has little or no education, and sees prostitution as the way to make the most money possible for her family, then she will sacrifice herself in this way.
- 2) If poverty and culture are exploited in developing countries, then why are there so many women and young girls who are victims of human trafficking and prostitution in *developed* countries? The second vulnerability factor is the *incidence of childhood sexual abuse*. In my own country, the USA, as many as 70-95% of those

working in prostitution have been sexually abused as children in their families or communities. Sexual abuse does inestimable harm to the soul of young person. Children who have been abused live with immense sexual confusion which can lead to their identities being defined by sexual expression.

In the USA, Canada and the UK, drug abuse and prostitution very often go hand in hand. People often say, "they're working to support drug habits". That may be true. Often, drugs are used to numb the emotional pain of an abusive childhood and result in the downward spiral of addiction to both the drugs and to the prostitution that supports the habit. In some cases, the pimps have forced the drug abuse in order to keep the girls and women dependent and in an endless cycle of working for drugs and providing money for him.

3) For a number of years, I only used the 2 broad categories of poverty/ culture childhood sexual abuse that I have just named to describe vulnerafactors. bility And then I was confronted by a dear Christian woman in



wealthy country who chastised me: "My daughter is also a victim of human trafficking and prostitution" she told me. "And she is neither poor nor was she abused. Rather she was "groomed" into prostitution by a man who developed a relationship with her with the goal that he would become her pimp and have her working in prostitution." I learned from this broken-hearted woman that I must include the category of "grooming" to describe a 3<sup>rd</sup> major vulnerability factor.

In The Netherlands, those who "groom" teen-age girls into prostitution are called "lover-boys" by those girls. However, there's no true "love" involved - only exploitation. "Lover-boys" hang around places where teen-age girls would be: on the edge of high school grounds or shopping malls, at discothèques or beaches. They compliment the girls as they walk past: "oh you're so beautiful". If the girl has a strong sense of self-esteem, she will just say "thanks!" and keep walking. But a girl who doesn't hear many compliments, who has low self-esteem, will stop, the compliments will continue, dates will be made and the "lover-boy" knows that he has

her hooked. He will do everything to convince her that he is her only love, that her family and friends don't love her as much as he does, and in this way, he attempts to isolate her from her primary relationships. A sexual relationship develops, and thereafter, he convinces her that she should have sex with his friends. There may be gang-rape. And then comes the moment when all of the sudden he has no money. And, he continues, since she's had sex with so many men already, working in prostitution will not be any different and will solve all their financial problems. She comes to believe that the more money she makes for him, the more he will love her, or love her again. By this time, she's found out that he has 3 or 4 or 5 other women working for him but she's sure that she's the one he loves the most.

"Grooming" girls into prostitution as a form of human trafficking was previously an invisible phenomenon and certainly wasn't identified as trafficking. Many people wanted to believe that since the women were not chained to the brothels and could walk away at any time, they had obviously "chosen" to work there. And yes, there is an element of "choice". But I always say that "choice" has a very thin veneer. Scratch the thin surface of "choice" and you find the story behind the story of woundedness and helplessness and hopelessness. I know that I, personally, had little self-esteem when I was 15 or 16 years old, and am thankful that, by the Grace of God, no one set out to groom me into prostitution!

## Dear Sisters, I pray:

- --- that the more deeply you understand the women (and men) who are victims of trafficking/prostitution that you see and hear about, the more compassion you will feel.
- --- that YOU will pray that God will continue to raise up individuals who are Called to offer God's Unconditional Love to those who are trapped.

Please Pray for your EBF Anti-Trafficking Network, meeting in St. Petersburg, Russia, August 23-25. Pray that more and more Believers in this part of the world will have a compassionate heart for victims of human trafficking/prostitution and feel led to creatively minister in Christ's name to their needs.

# Window to the World

Karin Lignel Christiansen, the president of the Danish Baptist Womens Union, visited the Womens Department in Burundi's Baptist church. Niels Chr. and Solveig Nielsen accompanied her to help to translate into local language. They speak the

language and know the culture as former missionaries. Since 1928 Danish Baptists has been committed to mission in Burundi. The Baptist Union of Denmark (BUD) and the Union des Eglise Baptistes du Burundi (UEBB) have worked together since 1963, when Burundi became independent, as equal partners. Karin, Niels Chr. and Solveig travelled through Burundi and visited 11 women's groups and churches.

Being welcomed in the elegant Bujumbura airport is a unique experience. In keeping with tradition we were met by a whole delegation of leaders from the Burundi Baptist Church and Francoise, Magarita, Marie Jose and Vénance, who are leaders of the women department. The time had come to meet the women, with whom I had had email correspondence for two years, and I sensed that they were as excited as I was to finally meet.

Solveig and Niels Chr. Nielsen (ex-missionaries) accompanied me as interpreters and co-workers. They spoke the Kirundi language, they knew our partners – several of them personally – and they knew the local culture and shared a spiritual connection. On top of this we benefited from our on-site contact Susi Baggesen's expertise, which she had gained during a two-year long co-operation. These were all prerequisites of a successful dialogue between our different cultures. Linguistic, cultural and spiritual inexperience might well ruin well-intentioned negotiations.

The conversations with the women from the women's department were exciting, instructive and challenging. We established a close, loving, honest and humourous rapport. We would not have come far without the above-mentioned experience as well as my own experience of communication and educational theories. It ended up being a warm and lovely journey.

Generally speaking our conversations focused on ways in which we could offer assistance supplementary to the locals' own efforts. The women's most urgent need was specifically financial means to enable them to work as inspirators and catalysts by visiting the numerous women's groups in the different churches.

On the third day we filled up the good four-wheel drive belonging to our delegate as this vehicle was suitable for the extremely challenging roads. After the morning prayer, which seemed particularly relevant knowing the traffic in Burundi, we visited three women's groups on the first day with Niels Chr. Nielsen as a skilled driver guided by the women. First visit - Ceyerezi. Seeing the colourful and beautiful women welcoming us with African dances was evocative. (I so wish I had that sense of rhythm.)



Magarita, beautiful a young woman, minister's wife and mother, whom I had met previously, vividly described the lobby work. They were cultivating the land, weaving baskets and teaching together as well as sharing joys and sorrows. Women and families with special needs are close to Magarita's heart. These include women due

to give birth, and Margarita was one of the women who were in desperate need of our first aid kits. Solveig and Susi were highly instrumental in making sure these kits reached the people who needed them. In Ceyerez there was also a young man, who was an accomplished baker. This made them consider the possibility of making and selling bread in the market. We were lucky enough to try out this bread along with a coke.

I can still picture the women in Bwari, Kayanza, Murama, Karonge and Kibingo – beautiful, rhythmically dancing and singing wearing colourful dresses surrounded by children or carrying children on their backs. Brave, strong, proud and giggling with a humourous twinkle, but at the same time poor, worn-out, tired with almost stony looks and faces reflecting anxiety. I saw these women walking long distances carrying heavy weights, their stature erect and with open attitudes. I cannot conceive how, but they managed to bounce back despite poverty and repeated conflicts and wars. Numerous rapes resulting in unwanted pregnancies and children not knowing who their fathers are, are one of the most serious consequences of the war. Another consequence of the war is the great number of widows and traumatised men. Everywhere we went we were asked to support the widows in particular.

I vividly remember the young woman from Karonge, who deeply concentrating told us about the women and the work. She was reading aloud from her meticulously written notes. She told us that 88 % of the women had never learned to read. Personally she had learned to read recently in connection with the literacy campaign led by Susi. "The need for education is massive. Please help us teach more people how to read." We heard this appeal over and over again.

I so wish another campaign would follow with an emphasis on educating teachers, making it a case of supplementary assistance (my own comment). Such a follow-up should be aimed at both men and women. However, experience shows that women and men should be taught separately. Men have a privileged position and become domineering in an educational setup within a society suppressing women.

We left the small school after a lovely meal, taking with us pineapple and papaya, which we had for lunch the next day. What an impressive strength and dignity in the face of poverty.

Visiting the women in Murama was an intense experience. The minister Simon is a highly gifted minister, craftsman, administrator and organiser. The women benefited very much from these gifts of grace. Many learned how to sew, read, cultivate the earth, keep goats etc.

A clear example for imitation. Françoise and her co-leaders have made extensive use of the experiences from Murama as an educational example when inspiring other women's groups on the remainder of our journey.

The women from the area surrounding Bujumbura (the capital) had been invited to a meeting with us one afternoon.

Many had come a long way on foot to join us. A lot of young women were present surrounded by children on the floor or carrying children on their backs. I only knew a few



of them beforehand, but it was a fantastic sensation making eye contact everywhere. I met smiling and also slightly shy and bashful young women.

I participated somewhat awkwardly in the dance, and the women appreciated that. I gave a lesson again similarly to all the other places. "Woman – know that you are loved and that you are invaluable in the eyes of the Lord. To God we are all equal regardless of gender. You have been created with talents and gifts of grace, which



you have been called to exert in His honour – bring forward your bodies as a living and holy sacrifice to please God – that is your spiritual service. When you dance, you praise God with your entire body." God has showered the African women with the grace of dance, music and singing.

The women asked Francoise: "Why didn't she [me] come from the early morning when we finally have someone who can teach?" How I would have loved to have spent the entire day with them.

You should have seen them when Solveig arrived later on with her bag full of the knitted sweaters from Denmark. It was a glorious sight. A mother came over and let

me hold her little girl.



1200 black faces and 4 white ones were present at the service in Kibogoye. 30 children were sitting immediately in front of us on a rug measuring 20 square metres. We had their full attention, because "those white people really look funny." I can still hear the children shouting

"abazungu" (white people) when they spotted us. There were exceptionally many children at church and they participated using their entire bodies. There were no disturbances as is the case in Danish churches, and they were praised by the minister when the service ended.

I was honoured to be allowed to deliver a sermon as a woman minister to this highly attentive audience. There is only one woman at the seminary, and she has not yet been called and ordained. Opinions are still divided on women ministers. But the

women said "Please tell our men that Denmark has women ministers."

500 people were at the service in Ngagara, including the four of us. I was allowed to deliver a sermon here as well. Listening to a woman reading a passage from the New Testament during the service made a deep impression on me. A year ago she had been asked to read aloud at the service, but she had declined explaining that she had left her glasses at home. In reality, she was embarrassed to admit that she did not




know how to read, but now she had joined the group of people who had learned to read. She was a charismatic woman blessed with the grace of being a "church mother" I can still picture her face.

When we set out on our journey, the big question was whether it still makes sense to co-operate. We are aware of certain difficulties. Like everywhere else there are administrators who "do not keep their accounts carefully." It is perfectly understandable that in areas of great poverty, a fair distribution of the aid given is not a seamless process. Many years of dependency upon external development aid can hamper the transition from charity to "supplementary assistance". Who has the greatest need? We are all poor! When we have 20 sewing machines, but 50 churches – who should be the beneficiaries? Support and partnership are essential.

The importance of partnership becomes particularly obvious when travelling around Burundi and meeting the church members. This is when we feel connected through Christ – an intense, warm and moving feeling.

After the visit and conversations there is no doubt in my mind that we should continue to partner up to do missionary work. But the prerequisite for a continued partnership, as I see it, is that we as a church and a women's union have one or more country representatives through the Baptist church in Burundi – representatives who speak preferably Kirundi or French and English, are familiar with the local culture and have mental ballast.



Visiting the 11 women's groups and churches together with the women was an intense, exciting, educational, warm and moving experience. How I burn with love for these wonderful women. By supporting the women, we support families.

I pray fervently that these women will achieve equal rights and receive an education to grant them social, cultural and spiritual influence in a society, which suffers in so many ways.

I hope that they and we, being the work of God, created in Jesus Christ, will travel in the good deeds which have been laid out by God for us to travel in.





# Life and Work of Polish Baptist Women for the Lord

There are approximately 4500 baptized members in the Polish Baptist Union of which women are a meaningful and important part of the Body of Christ.

In the 76 churches all around Poland women carry responsibilities of mission and service.

Every four years a Committee of Women Church

Council is elected to represent and organize some work and conferences in Poland. In many churches sisters of all ages are involved and we are thankful to God that national conferences and local meetings are attended by younger and younger sisters every year. This year when the conference in Krakow took place an eighteen year old sister attended.

Women are involved in church and social work in many ways. We meet for prayer meetings when we praise God, but also intercede for many needs of other people and nations. This year when meeting for the World Day of Prayer (WBWA) we prayed with all our hearts for all the needs mentioned in the prayer letter. In Katowice Baptist church where I come from, meditation and sharing on the fruit of the Spirit presented a wonderful possibility to make it not only a spiritual, but also a visual experience. Sisters shared about the fruit of the Spirit one by one, there was also a grapevine made of balloons and every balloon had the name of one fruit of the Spirit written on it. After the official part we prepared bookmarks with verses about fruit of the Spirit.

Sisters prepare agape meals for different occasions, one of which is a Christmas supper for the elderly church members. The majority of these seniors are not able to come to church on a regular basis. Sisters also organize meals for the homeless, hungry and unemployed. There is mission work among alcoholics, broken families, and abused spouses. Every summer women help with summer camps for children, youth or seniors.

God blesses us in our life and work. We realize how much our country needs Jesus. We pray and ask for prayers for our mission among the unbelievers and people who have not given their life to Jesus in spite of being called Christians in the nation where almost every born child is baptized. We need strength, endurance, and wisdom. Wisdom is also needed for organizing and getting finances for the basic work

and help which we may offer.

Thanks be to God that He is able to give us all we need, to give us faith, the most crucial thing, to carry on, keep joyful and not to give up until Jesus comes back.

#### 55th Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)



The Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) is a functional commission of the United Nations Economic and Social Council. It is the principal global policy-making body dedicated exclusively to gender equality and advancement of women. Every year, representatives of Member States gather at United Nations Headquarters in New York to evaluate progress on gender equality, identify challenges, set global standards and formulate concrete policies to promote gender equality and women's empowerment worldwide.

The 55<sup>th</sup> session of the CSW took place in New York from February 22 to March 4, 2011. During these two weeks, government officials, representatives of the United Nations and civil society, the media and Non Government Organizations (NGOs) met at United Nations Headquarters to share experiences and good practices, as well as agree on priority actions to deal with continuous obstacles in order to accelerate progress towards equality. <a href="http://www.endvawnow.org/">http://www.endvawnow.org/</a>
